

## Lancashire Constabulary has made some improvements to how it identifies, monitors and manages integrity issues

In 2011, the Home Secretary asked Her Majesty's Inspectorate of Constabulary (HMIC) to look at "instances of undue influence, inappropriate contractual arrangements and other abuses of power in police relationships with the media and other parties".

While the resulting report, *Without Fear or Favour*, found no evidence that corruption was endemic in police service relationships, it did not issue a clean bill of health. In particular, HMIC was concerned that few forces provided any policy or guidance in relation to social media, and what second jobs are suitable for officers and staff. The report made several recommendations to help the service address these issues.

In 2012 HMIC revisited all forces to track progress against these recommendations.

In Lancashire Constabulary, HMIC found:

- Since 2011 Lancashire Constabulary has conducted its own integrity 'health check', which resulted in numerous actions to improve in different areas.
- The constabulary has reviewed its policies that relate to integrity issues, and either
  has, or is currently, updating them all although more needs to be done to let staff
  know about this.
- The constabulary has updated its media policy, which is now in line with national guidance and is much clearer about how relationships with the media should be managed.
- Between September 2011 and May 2012, the constabulary did not have cause to investigate any instances of inappropriate disclosures to the media.
- The constabulary has existing guidance, as part of its Counter Corruption Strategy, on how police officers and staff should behave both while at work and when they are off duty. This guidance is currently being reviewed and updated as part of the force's new social media policy.
- HMIC's independently commissioned research identified three cases of what could be considered inappropriate behaviour on Twitter or Facebook by members of staff in Lancashire, which have been referred back to the constabulary.
- Since September 2011 there have been 145 applications for second jobs, 140 of which have been approved.
- Data provided by the force to HMIC shows that there has been no change in the number of staff working in the anti-corruption unit since our 2011 inspection.

HM Inspector of Constabulary for the Northern Region, Roger Baker QPM, said:

"Lancashire Constabulary has made some improvements to how it identifies, monitors and manages integrity issues since HMIC last reviewed this in 2011.

This reflects our findings across the whole of England and Wales, where we found that the police service is making progress in how it monitors and safeguards relationships with the media, contractors and others. However, we are concerned that changes have not been implemented at a quicker pace. HMIC will therefore continue to monitor and inspect progress in order to provide the public with assurance that all forces are gripping these vital issues."

In 2011, the Home Secretary asked Her Majesty's Inspectorate of Constabulary (HMIC) to look at "instances of undue influence, inappropriate contractual arrangements and other abuses of power in police relationships with the media and other parties". The resulting report, Without Fear or Favour, was based on an inspection of all 43 forces in England and Wales, as well as the British Transport Police (BTP), the National Policing Improvement Agency (NPIA) and, at its request, the Police Service of Northern Ireland (PSNI). We also ran telephone surveys to find out if the public thought corruption was a problem for the Service, and looked at police use of social media. - 3. The revisit used the 2011 criteria and was based on self assessments by 44 forces (including the British Transport Police), supported by inspection work in July and August 2012. HMIC also repeated and extended the surveys of public opinion on the range and type of corruption issues in the police service, and of police use of social media.
