HMIC Best Use of Stop and Search (BUSS) scheme revisit assessment

Further to HMI Mike Cunningham's letter dated 23 June 2016, I am writing to inform you of the findings of our re-assessment of your force's compliance with the BUSS scheme. The revisit was carried out between 24 June 2016 and 5 August 2016, and included a review of your website and force documentation and consultation with relevant staff. Thank you for the assistance provided by your staff for this revisit.

HMIC's 2015 legitimacy inspection found that your force was not complying with three features of the scheme in 2015. Our recent assessment found that, at the time of the revisit, South Wales Police was still not complying with one feature of the scheme: recording and publishing outcomes. Our detailed assessment is set out at Annex A.

I am aware that, since our revisit, the force has taken action to address this issue. You will see that we have referred to this progress in our assessment, so the Home Secretary can take this into account when making decisions on continuing scheme membership.

	The force does not record or publish the full range of stop and search outcomes. Khat warnings are used by the force as an outcome but it does not record or publish data on such warnings. However, the force expects that changes it is making to its mobile data technology will allow such recording by September 2016.
	The data are published on the police.uk website, although it excludes data about khat warnings and cautions. There is a clear link from the force's website to the South Wales Police Stop and Search Overview page on police.uk.
	At the time of the revisit, the force did not publish data to show whether the outcomes of searches were linked to the object(s) searched for.
	We are aware that, since our revisit, the force has started to provide police.uk with data detailing whether the outcomes of searches were linked to the object(s) searched for. The force is now compliant with this feature of the scheme.
